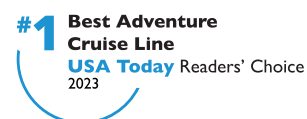

## Itinerary

**Day 1:** St. John's, NL, Canada

### **Begin Your Adventure**

Welcome to St. John's—Newfoundland's historic, vibrant capital. Sailing out of the port of St. John's, Signal Hill keeps watch as we exit the world-famous Narrows. The charming houses of the Battery are always a hit with shutterbugs in search of picture perfect Newfoundland scenery. Watch for icebergs, whales, and seabirds as we sail!

**Day 2-3:** Northeast Coast

### **Visit Picturesque Villages & Charming Communities**

The northeast coast of Newfoundland is known for the dozens of picturesque villages that dot its rocky shores, and we'll find harbour in one of these unique communities. Expect a friendly Newfoundland greeting upon arrival. Don't miss the chance to spot massive icebergs, majestic whales, and seabirds while exploring the area. Photographers will be delighted to capture the unique beauty of Newfoundland's natural wonders.

**Day 4:** L'Anse aux Meadows

### **Immerse Yourself in Viking Archaeology**

L'Anse aux Meadows, a UNESCO World Heritage Site, is the only authenticated Norse settlement in North America. The archaeological remains found here in 1960 date to approximately 1000 CE. Amazingly,

the location was first established by a close reading of the Viking sagas.

Today, a superb interpretation centre and several reconstructed Norse-style sod buildings make L'Anse aux Meadows a must-see for any visitor to Newfoundland and Labrador.

**Day 5:** Red Bay

### **Soak in Basque Whaling History**

The Red Bay Basque Whaling Station became a UNESCO World Heritage site in 2013. Basque whalers operated out of the Red Bay harbour in the 1500s, North America's first export industry.

The interpretation centre at Red Bay is beyond excellent. Here we find tools, personal items, and navigational instruments recovered from the wreck of the whaling ship *San Juan*. The ship was lost in a storm in 1565 and found centuries later submerged in the harbour. We'll visit nearby Saddle Island to learn the history of the whaling industry.

### **Day 6-7:** Gros Morne National Park & Woody Point **Hike through Incredible Geology**

Gros Morne National Park's Tablelands, a six-hundred-metre plateau, form one of the world's best examples of exposed mantle. Normally found below the Earth's crust, the mineral-rich rocks support very little life,

making the Tablelands an eerie landscape. We will offer various walking and hiking options here. Views of Bonne Bay are spectacular. Gros Morne's interpretation centre is excellent and the town of Woody Point is a delight to explore.

**Day 8-9:** Southern Coast

### **Explore Scenic Coastlines & Remote Outports**

The wild and windswept coast of southern Newfoundland is home to a few remaining outport communities. Visits here are often a highlight on our trips.

There are many choices of unique bays and coves to explore via Zodiac or land excursions. Along the coast, the geology is outstanding, and the plant life is gorgeous. We'll be on the watch for wildlife, too. We'll make the most of every chance to explore this beautiful and remote coast.



**Day 10:** Miawpukek (Conne River)

### **Experience Mi'kmaw Culture**

The First Nations community of Miawpukek became a permanent settlement sometime around 1822. Before then, it was one of many semi-permanent camping sites used by the Mi'kmaw people—who had traditionally travelled nomadically throughout the east coast of Canada.

Since its establishment as a reserve in 1987, Miawpukek has successfully bridged traditional knowledge and contemporary practice. We will receive a formal welcome from local



leaders and have a chance to explore this special community.

**Day 11:** Saint-Pierre, France

### **Savour European Shops & Cafés**

Explore Saint-Pierre, a last bastion of France's colonial territories in North America. The colourful and charming shops and residences of the town of Saint-Pierre reveal its unique historical character.

French food, wine, clothing, and culture are all on offer here. The sweets at the local cafes and bakeries are in high demand. Saint-Pierre offers a taste of European living, just a short sail from the coast of Newfoundland!

**Day 12:** St. John's, NL, Canada

### **Wave a Fond Farewell**

On the final day of our expedition, we sail back through the Narrows and into St. John's harbour. We will say our farewells and the expedition team will be on hand to assist you with luggage and transportation arrangements.

**Day 3-5:** Sable Island, NS

### **See World-Famous Wild Horses**

See the world-famous Sable Island wild horses, the largest grey seal colony in the world, and its many varieties of birds—including the endemic Ipswich Sparrow.

Hike the island's sand dunes, take a Zodiac cruise along its shores, and learn first-hand about its fascinating human history.

Due to the unique weather conditions, we'll maximize opportunities for you to explore.

**Day 6:** The Gully Marine Protected Area

### **Search for Whales and Dolphins**

Sail through the Gully, a marine protected area where the sea floor plunges two and a half kilometres into a submarine valley; it's one of the most prominent undersea features in eastern Canada.

Learn about the diversity of shallow and deep-water fish that attract whales and dolphins. Join our onboard researchers out on deck to scan the waves for exciting sightings and to appreciate this abundance of marine life!

**Day 7:** Cape Breton Island & Bird Islands

### **Enjoy Birdwatching & Zodiac Cruising**

Immerse yourself in Cape Breton Island's natural history, from its diverse habitats and wildlife to its rugged landscape formed by geological forces. Explore the island's unique cultural landscape, shaped by Mi'kmaq, Scottish, and Acadian people. Discover the island's boreal forests and wetlands, home to majestic moose, black bears, and bald eagles.

Take a Zodiac cruise around Bird Island, a critical seabird nesting and breeding area with

Canada's largest colony of great cormorants. Watch for black-legged kittiwakes, razorbills, Atlantic puffins, black guillemots, and even Leach's storm petrels.

**Day 8:** Chéticamp

### **Hike the Cape Breton Highlands**

Call in at the fishing village of Chéticamp on the western shore of Cape Breton Island. Enjoy the busy fishing harbour, rug-hooking museum, shops, and restaurants that all offer a taste of true Acadian heritage.

Hike the spectacular Skyline Trail at nearby Cape Breton Highlands National Park, world-renowned for its wildlife and scenery of rugged highlands and wind-swept coasts.

**Day 9:** Charlottetown, PEI

### **Step into the Past and Savour the Present**

Enjoy your free time while exploring Charlottetown. Wander through the historic downtown area, where the Charlottetown Conference took place and Canada's Constitution was born. Treat yourself to the best of local cuisine, including fresh seafood, produce, and craft beer.

You could also opt for a guided cultural tour at Lennox Island Mi'kmaq First Nation. Learn the art of crafting beaded jewelry and woven baskets, make traditional bannock bread, and listen to stories passed down through generations.

**Day 10:** Les Îles-de-la-Madeleine, QC

### **Revel in Acadian Culture**

Spend the day exploring the robust Acadian heritage, culture, cuisine, and language of Les Îles-de-la-Madeleine (the Magdalen Islands).

Admire the striking red sandstone cliffs that, although a part of Québec, are in fact geographically closer to Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island.

Meet some of the 12,000 or so friendly residents who call this archipelago home and

be sure to browse the shops and restaurants for handicrafts, seafood, local wines and beers!

### **Welcome to France**

Just off the shores of Newfoundland lie the islands of Saint-Pierre and Miquelon—an official territory of the French Republic.

Admire the town's unique historical character before you board the *Ocean Endeavour* for an evening departure.

**Day 2-3:** The South Coast, NL, Canada

### **Explore Scenic Coastlines & Remote Outports**

Journey through the beautiful and windswept coast of southern Newfoundland, dotted with bays, coves, and a few remaining remote outport communities.

Admire outstanding geology and gorgeous botanical life. Spot an abundance of birds, whales, and other wildlife as we make the most of every opportunity for Zodiac cruises and land excursions.

**Day 4:** Gros Morne National Park & Woody Point

### **Hike through Incredible Geology**

Stretch your legs with a walk or hike at Gros Morne National Park.

Soak in the extraordinary views of beautiful Bonne Bay and be sure to take time to explore the park's excellent interpretation centre and the town of Woody Point. Witness for yourself, the spectacular Tablelands, a six-hundred-metre plateau that forms one of the world's best examples of exposed mantle.

Normally found below the Earth's crust, the mineral-rich rocks support very little life, making the Tablelands an eerie landscape.

**Day 5:** Battle Harbour

### **Experience Life as it was in the 1800s**

Experience the rugged beauty and fascinating history of Battle Harbour, Newfoundland and Labrador's hidden gem! This restored 19th-century fishing village is located on a small island in the Labrador Sea and was once the salt fish capital of the world.

Walk in the footsteps of traditional fishermen and merchants, and experience life as it was in the 1800s.

**Day 6:** Labrador Coast

### **Enjoy Hiking & Zodiac Cruises**

Wander the southern Labrador coast, where you'll find diverse geography of coastal barrens, high subarctic tundra, high boreal forest, mid-boreal forest, string bog, and islands.

We'll seek chances for an exciting Zodiac cruise or hike whenever possible during expedition landings in this beautiful and serene region.

**Day 7:** Nain

### **Experience Inuit Culture**

Visit Nain, the most northerly community in Labrador. Stop in at the historic Moravian church and learn about its history, listen to the brass band, and visit Illusuak—the stunning new cultural centre by the waterfront. The

cultural center showcases the history, language and culture of the Inuit of Labrador.

Expect a warm welcome and the opportunity to peruse plenty of arts and handicrafts during this dynamic visit.

Many of our expedition team members call Nain home. You'll have the opportunity to explore their community through walking tours and scenic hikes.

**Day 8:** Hebron

### **Ponder Poignant History**

Step back in time to the historical site of Hebron, which preserves a Moravian Mission station dating from the 1830s. Visit the old church, which is where Inuit who resided here in 1959 learned they would be forced to relocate.

Take a moment to read the plaque that commemorates this history and the apology to people affected by the relocations. Listen to the stories shared by our guides and meet former Hebron residents and their kin, who continue to visit the site to hunt and fish nearby.

**Day 9-12:** Torngat Mountains National Park

### **Hike the Mountainous Tundra & Spot Wildlife**

Spend four days exploring an area of treeless, mountainous tundra in Torngat Mountains National Park, where some of Canada's highest peaks east of the Rockies are found.

Enjoy your time hiking, visiting archaeological sites, and Zodiac cruising. Here, Inuit of Nunatsiavut will be your guides in their spiritual homeland. Inuit of Nunavik and Nunatsiavut play a key role as partners in the management of Torngat Mountains National Park.

Many see the park as a portal for better understanding of Inuit culture. The word Torngat is derived from the Inuttut word tongait, meaning "place of spirits," where Inuit shamans travelled to connect with higher powers. It is not hard, even for a visitor, to feel the power of the place.



Also be on the lookout for marine mammals, polar and black bears, falcons, and eagles.

**Day 13-14:** Hudson Strait & Frobisher Bay

### **Witness Wildlife, Geology, and Ice**

Sail through this beautiful bay named for bygone explorer Martin Frobisher and stay on the lookout for wildlife, such as polar bears, seabirds, walruses, and different species of whales and seals.

Our geologists will have you raving about rocks! Expect compelling scenery and soak up the Arctic splendour.

**Day 15:** Iqaluit, NU, Canada

### **Wave a Fond Farewell**

Iqaluit, at the head of Frobisher Bay, is Nunavut's capital. A population of nearly 8,000 residents call the city home.

Transfer from the Ocean Endeavour by Zodiac through the Iqaluit harbour for your charter flight to Ottawa, ON.

# Itinerary

**Day 1:** Iqaluit, NU, Canada

## **Begin Your Adventure**

Iqaluit, at the head of Frobisher Bay, is Nunavut's capital. A population of nearly 8,000 call Iqaluit home. Local attractions include the territorial legislature, igloo-inspired St. Jude's Cathedral, art shops, and more.

We will transfer by Zodiac to the *Ocean Endeavour* through the Iqaluit harbour.

**Day 2:** Frobisher Bay

## **Witness Wildlife, Geology, and Ice**

We'll be on the lookout for wildlife, of course, and our geologists will have you raving about rocks. Expect compelling scenery, and soak up the Arctic splendour as we go!

**Day 3:** Kimmirut (Lake Harbour)

## **Experience Inuit Culture**

Kimmirut means "the heel" in Inuktitut, referring to an outcrop of marble across the bay from the community.

Art aficionados may know the hamlet as Lake Harbour, home to one of the first Hudson's Bay Company outposts on Baffin Island. Art has played a major role in putting Kimmirut on the map. The hamlet of approximately four hundred is known for its ivory scrimshaw and jewellery making. The blooming tundra offers easy walking.

**Day 4:** Kinngait (Cape Dorset)

## **Visit World-Famous Art Studios**

Kinngait was ground zero for the Inuit art market. In 1959, the West Baffin Eskimo Co-operative was established—the oldest professional Inuit printmaking studio in Canada.

Old and new generations of outstanding artists, carvers, and printmakers continue to make Kinngait a proud centre for Inuit art. We'll

visit studios and meet the artists here—an opportunity to purchase outstanding works.

**Day 5:** Hudson Strait

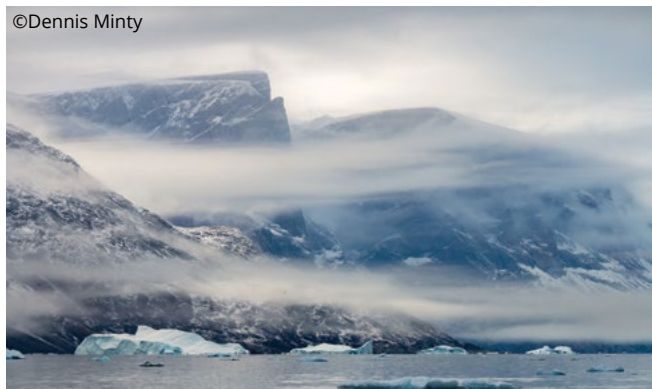

After your charter flight from Toronto, ON, you'll transfer to the *Ocean Endeavour* by Zodiac. Begin your journey by sailing down Kangerlussuaq Fjord (Søndre Strømfjord), a 190-kilometre-long fjord surrounded by mountains and glaciers, and cross the Arctic Circle on your way.

## **Day 2:** Kangerlussuatsiaq Fjord **Take a Zodiac Cruise at the Foot of a Glacier**

See why Kangerlussuatsiaq lives up to its Danish name, Evighedsfjorden, which means "the fjord of eternity." Marvel at this complex coastal waterway that includes calving glaciers, sheer bird cliffs, and streams cascading against a towering mountain backdrop. Explore this sublime glacial landscape by ship and by Zodiac.

## **Day 3:** Nuuk **Visit Museums, Shops, and Cafés**

Stop in at vibrant Nuuk, the capital of Greenland. Visit the Greenland National Museum, where the world-famous Qilakitsoq mummies rest. The old harbour includes many buildings dating from Danish colonial days, while contemporary Nuuk is known for art, shopping, pubs, and cafés.



## **Day 4:** At Sea — Davis Strait **Learn Onboard**

Deepen your understanding of the environment, cultures, and history of the region as we steam across the Davis Strait towards Labrador. Enjoy workshops and presentations, watch a documentary, and get out on deck! Keep your binoculars ready to spot whales and seabirds who follow in our wake.



## **Day 5–8:** Torngat Mountains National Park, NL, Canada

### **Hike the Mountainous Tundra & Spot Wildlife**

Spend four days exploring an area of treeless, mountainous tundra in Torngat Mountains National Park, where some of Canada's highest peaks east of the Rockies are found. Enjoy your time hiking, visiting archaeological sites, and Zodiac cruising. Here, Inuit of Nunatsiavut will be your guides in their spiritual homeland. Be on the lookout for marine mammals, polar and black bears, caribou, falcons, and eagles.

## **Day 9:** Hebron **Ponder Poignant History**

Step back in time to the historical site of Hebron, which preserves a Moravian Mission station dating from the 1830s. Call in at the old church, which is where Inuit who resided here in 1959 learned they would be forced to relocate.

Take a moment to read the plaque that commemorates this history and the apology to people affected by the relocations, issued by



the government of Newfoundland & Labrador in 2005. Listen to the stories shared by our guides and meet former Hebron residents.

**Day 10:** Nain

### **Experience Inuit Culture**

Visit thriving Nain, the most northerly community in Labrador and the administrative capital of Nunatsiavut. Stop in at the historic Moravian church, enjoy the vibrant brass band, and visit Illusuak, the stunning new cultural centre.

Expect a warm welcome and the opportunity to peruse plenty of arts and handicrafts at this dynamic visit. This will be your first chance to see trees since the start of your journey!

**Day 11-12:** The Labrador Coast

### **Enjoy Hiking & Zodiac Cruises**

Explore the southern Labrador coast, where you'll find a diverse geography of coastal barrens, high subarctic tundra, high boreal forest, mid-boreal forest, string bog, and islands. Choose the activity you prefer during expedition landings in this beautiful and quiet region.

### **Immerse Yourself in Viking Archaeology**

This hot spring has been cherished for centuries, with a notable tale about Leif Erikson who, a thousand years ago, took a refreshing swim before embarking on his journey towards uncharted lands to the west.

Unlike volcanic hot springs, this oasis gets its warmth from geothermal subsoil. As the soil layers rub against each other in the spring, the water is heated, reaching temperatures of around 38 degrees Celsius (100 degrees Fahrenheit).

Walk amongst a reconstructed Norse church and Viking longhouse to fully immerse yourself in the experience.

It was once the home of Viking explorer Erik the Red and his descendants until the 1400s. Today, Greenlandic Inuit run the sheep farms originally worked by Norse settlers.

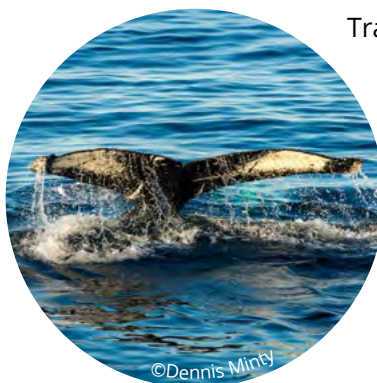
### **Experience Inuit Culture**

Thanks in part to its sheltered setting, this is among the oldest permanently inhabited spots on Baffin Island, with a storied legacy as a Hudson's Bay Company trading post, a producer of Inuit jewellery and ivory scrimshaw art.

Immerse yourself in the vibrant culture and rich history of the community as you connect with friendly locals. They'll regale you with captivating stories and lead you to enchanting sites such as the old Anglican church, the RCMP post, the original Hudson Bay post, the Co-op, and Northern stores.

If you're a hiker, you'll enjoy walking through Kimmirut's blooming tundra on the Itijjagial Trail, part of the Trans Canada Trail.



**Day 12:** Frobisher Bay

### **Witness Wildlife, Geology, and Ice**

Sail through this beautiful bay named for bygone explorer Martin Frobisher and stay on the lookout for wildlife.

**Day 8-9:** Tallurutiup Imanga (Lancaster Sound) and Devon Island

### **Seek Whales, Seabirds, and Polar Bears**

We will spend ample time exploring Tallurutiup Imanga (Lancaster Sound), one of the newest National Marine Conservation Areas in Nunavut. Narwhal, beluga, and bowhead whales transit and feed in this area.

Cruise by ship and Zodiac in search of wildlife with expert biologists and ecologists. Learn more about the crucial role Inuit play in conserving the vibrant biodiversity of these waterways and the enduring connection between the ocean and Inuit.

On the northern border of Tallurutiup Imanga lies Devon Island, the largest uninhabited island on Earth at over 50,000 square kilometres.

Flat-topped mountains, glacial valleys, and a substantial ice cap give Devon Island its unique character. We will hike the tundra, cruise a glacier face, and seek wildlife from the ship and on shore.

Visit archaeological sites and the remains of an RCMP and Hudson's Bay Company site at Dundas Harbour.

**Day 10:** Beechey Island

### **Visit a Franklin Expedition Historical Site**

In 1845, Sir John Franklin set out from England with HMS *Erebus* and HMS *Terror*, attempting to sail through the Northwest Passage. His crew overwintered at Beechey Island, where three of his men died.

Numerous search parties later used Beechey as a depot and rendezvous. Amundsen, Bernier, and Larsen visited Beechey. Thomas Morgan of the HMS *Investigator* was buried here in 1854 alongside Franklin's men. The graves and ruins of Northumberland House are a haunting memorial.

**Day 11:** Prince Regent Inlet  
**Enjoy Birdwatching and Zodiac Cruising**

This passage marks an area rich in marine and avian life. Thick-billed murres, ivory gulls, beluga whales, narwhals, and bowhead whales reside in the ice-strewn waters.

In addition to wildlife, we'll delve deeper into the exploration of the Northwest Passage and mercantile efforts of the Hudson's Bay Company.

**Day 12:** Ikirahaq (Bellot Strait)

### **Witness the Most Northerly Point of Continental North America**

Discover the famed Ikirahaq (Bellot Strait), a narrow passage separating Somerset Island from the Boothia Peninsula. As we sail through this two-kilometre-wide waterway, get the unique opportunity to reach the northernmost part of mainland North America.

**Day 17:** Kugluktuk, NU, Canada

### **Wave a Fond Farewell**

Located at the mouth of the Coppermine River, Kugluktuk is the westernmost community in Nunavut. Known for many years as Coppermine, the community reverted to its original Inuinnaqtun name—meaning “place of moving waters”—on January 1st, 1996.

Iqaluktuuttiaq (Cambridge Bay), NU, is an alternate disembarkation point, and may be used based on sea, ice, and weather conditions.

Today we will disembark and make our way to the airport to meet our charter flights to Yellowknife, NT.



### **Day 1:** Kugluktuk (Coppermine), NU, Canada **Begin Your Adventure**

Located at the mouth of the Coppermine River, Kugluktuk is the westernmost community in Nunavut. Known for many years as Coppermine, the community reverted to its original Inuinnaqtun name—meaning “place of moving waters”—on January 1st, 1996. Our charter flight will land in Kugluktuk and we will embark the ship by Zodiac.

Iqaluktuuttiaq (Cambridge Bay), NU, is an alternate embarkation point, and may be used based on sea, ice, and weather conditions.

### **Day 2-5:** Kitikmeot Region **Sail the Northwest Passage**

Navigate the ice-strewn waters of this fabled waterway in search of wildlife. Although this is Nunavut's least-populated region, this area is home to a diverse range of wildlife, both in the sea and on land.

Visit a local community where Inuit hosts will share their knowledge of their home and the area's history.

Discover the legacy of this important waterway and the captivating story of Roald Amundsen, who overwintered in the bay for two years while searching for the Northwest Passage. Learn more about the



triumphs of explorers like Amundsen and the vital role that Inuit knowledge played in successful crossings.

**Day 6:** Ikirahaq (Bellot Strait)

### **Day 7: Beechey Island Visit a Franklin Expedition Historical Site**

In 1845, Sir John Franklin set out from England with HMS *Erabus* and HMS *Terror*, attempting to sail

through the Northwest Passage. His crew overwintered at Beechey Island, where three of his men died.

Numerous search parties later used Beechey as a depot and rendezvous. Amundsen, Bernier, and Larsen visited Beechey. Thomas Morgan of HMS *Investigator* was buried here in 1854 alongside Franklin's men. The graves and the ruins of Northumberland House are a haunting memorial.

### **Day 8-9: Tallurutiup Imanga (Lancaster Sound) Seek Whales, Seabirds, and Polar Bears**

We will spend ample time exploring Tallurutiup Imanga (Lancaster Sound), one of the newest National Marine Conservation Areas in Nunavut. Narwhal, beluga, and bowhead whales transit and feed in this area.

Cruise by ship and Zodiac in search of wildlife with expert biologists and ecologists. Learn more about the crucial role Inuit play in conserving the vibrant biodiversity of these waterways and the enduring connection between the ocean and Inuit.

On the northern border of Tallurutiup Imanga lies Devon Island, the largest uninhabited island on Earth at over 50,000 square kilometres. Flat-topped mountains, glacial valleys, and a substantial ice cap give Devon Island its unique character. We will hike the tundra, cruise a glacier face, and seek wildlife from the ship and on shore.

Visit archaeological sites and the remains of an RCMP and Hudson's Bay Company site at Dundas Harbour.





**Day 10: Ausuittuq (Grise Fiord), NU**  
**Experience Inuit Culture**

Ausuittuq means "place that never thaws." 1,150 kilometres above the Arctic Circle, Canada's northernmost civilian community originated during the Cold War. In 1953, Inuit were relocated here by the Canadian government under false pretenses, with the aim of asserting Canadian sovereignty.

We'll be welcomed into the hamlet, where we will have a chance to meet members of the community, learn about their way of life, and hear their poignant stories.

**Day 11: Smith Sound**  
**Reach Your Furthest North**

Smith Sound, an ancient Inuit travel route, divides Ellesmere Island from Greenland, and served as the main route for explorers and adventurers searching for the North Pole. Adolphus Greely, Sir George Nares, and Elisha Kent Kane all travelled these waters with varying degrees of success.

**Day 12: At Sea**  
**Learn From Inuit in Their Homeland**

On this exploration day, we'll be making the most of what the wind, weather, and wildlife have to offer. Our expedition team will scan for polar bears, walrus, whales, seals, and seabirds as we go.

This is an excellent time to enjoy workshops, watch a documentary, or get out on deck. Keep your binoculars ready for minke and humpback whales,

as well as the seabirds that are sure to mark our passage.

Indulge in the unique opportunity to learn from Inuit in their homeland, gaining a better understanding of the daily lives of the regions we visit. Enjoy cultural performances and maybe even participate in Inuit games, or sample country food.

Through shared experiences and interactions, develop a deep appreciation for the region's vibrant culture and gain a connection to the stunning landscapes we traverse.

**Day 13-14: Northwest Greenland**  
**Hike the Tundra**

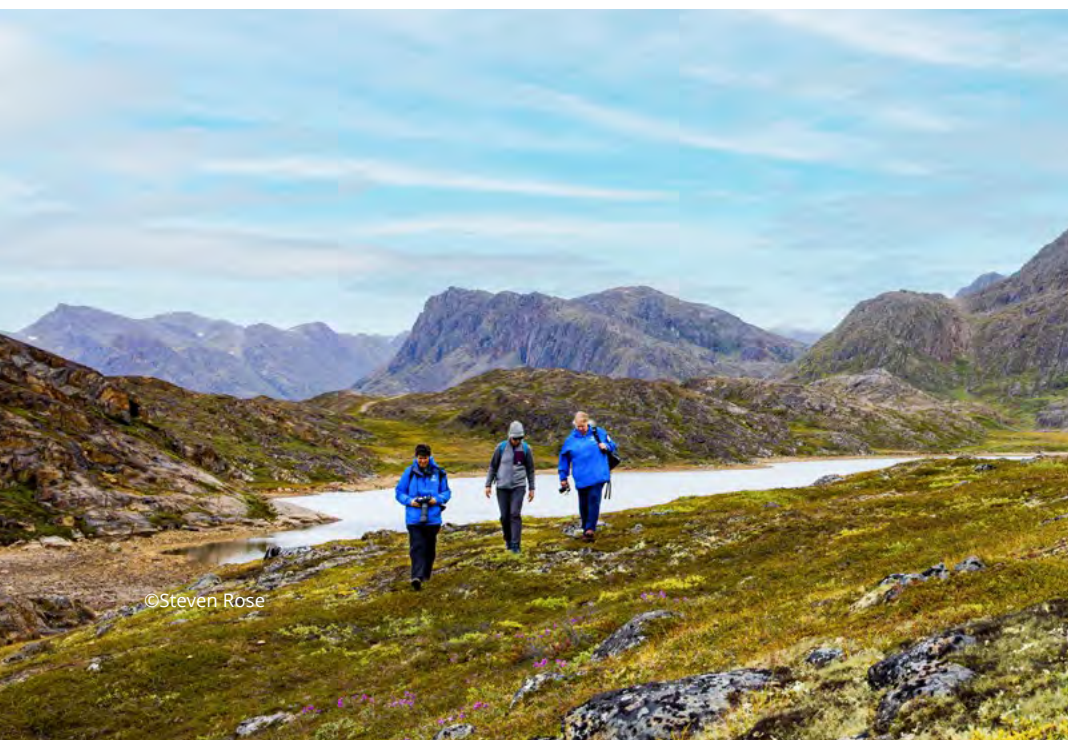
We will explore stunning fjords that line the coast. Glaciers and icebergs abound here. In true expedition style, we will seek opportunities to hike, explore, and view wildlife as conditions allow.

Whether you're setting foot on land, cruising by Zodiac, or out on the ship's deck, you'll have plenty of chances to learn alongside expert geologists, naturalists, and marine biologists. You'll gain an intimate perspective on the abundant flora and fauna you encounter.

Take a moment to savour the tranquility and absorb the knowledge and stories shared by

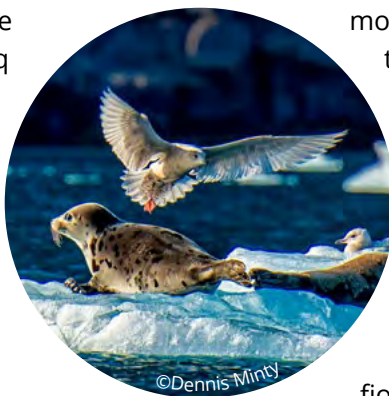


Inuit cultural educators, which will deepen your connection to this breathtaking landscape.

**Day 15: Ilulissat**  
**Take a Cruise Around Towering Icebergs**

Experience the remarkable beauty of Ilulissat Icefjord, renowned for its enormous icebergs. Ilulissat means “iceberg”—an apt name for this site at the outlet of the Sermeq Kujalleq glacier. It is a UNESCO World Heritage Site and the source of many of the icebergs in the North Atlantic.

Marvel at the sheer grandeur of the towering ice formations as you take a stroll along the boardwalk—truly a sight to behold! Visit the town, with its museums, charming cafes, craft shops, and bustling fishing harbour. Be sure to make your way to the Ilulissat Icefjord Centre, where you can delve into the fascinating narratives surrounding the ice and gain a deeper appreciation for this awe-inspiring natural wonder.



**Day 16: Sisimiut Coast**  
**Witness Stunning Glaciers, Islands, and Fjords**

Explore West Greenland’s complex coastal waterways that includes glaciers, islands, and fjords against a towering mountain backdrop, with plentiful opportunities for hiking and Zodiac cruising.

Learn about the Saqqaq, Dorset, Thule, and modern Inuit cultures that have called the Sisimiut region home for the past 4,500 years.

The waters are relatively warm here, due to the West Greenland Current and the subarctic location.

**Day 17: Kangerlussuaq, Greenland**  
**Cross the Arctic Circle**

Kangerlussuaq Fjord (Søndre Strømfjord) is one of the longest fjords in the world and boasts 190 kilometres of superb scenery. We end our adventure by sailing up this dramatic fjord.

Kangerlussuaq, the town at its eastern head, is a former U.S. Air Force base. Here we will disembark for our return charter flight to Toronto, ON.

## Itinerary

**Day 1:** Kangerlussuaq, Greenland

### **Cross the Arctic Circle**

Sail out of Kangerlussuaq Fjord (Søndre Strømfjord), a 190-kilometre-long fjord surrounded by mountains and glaciers. Cross the Arctic Circle and spend time on deck watching for aurora borealis.

After your charter flight from Toronto, ON, you'll transfer to the ship by Zodiac.

**Day 2:** Kangerlussuatsiaq Fjord (Evighedsfjorden)

### **Take a Zodiac Cruise at the Foot of a Glacier**

Kangerlussuatsiaq means “the rather big fjord” in Greenlandic, while the Danish name Evighedsfjorden

translates to “the fjord of eternity,” underscoring its vastness and seemingly never-ending nature.

See why Kangerlussuatsiaq Fjord lives up to its name and marvel at this waterway that includes calving glaciers, sheer bird cliffs, and streams cascading against a towering mountain backdrop.

**Day 3:** Nuuk

### **Visit Museums, Shops, and Cafés**

Stop in at vibrant Nuuk, the capital of Greenland. Visit the Greenland National Museum, one of the city's many outstanding features, where the world-famous Qilakitsoq mummies rest. The old harbour includes many buildings dating from Danish colonial

days, while contemporary Nuuk is known for art, shopping, pubs, and cafés.

#### **Day 4: At Sea — Davis Strait**

##### **Learn From Inuit in Their Homeland**

Deepen your understanding of the environment, cultures, and history of the region as we sail across the Davis Strait towards Labrador. Get the privileged opportunity to engage with and learn from Inuit in their homeland.

Enjoy workshops and presentations, watch a documentary, and get out on deck! Try your hand at athletic feats during an interactive cultural performance of Inuit games.

Through shared experiences and interactions, develop a deep appreciation for the culture and gain a connection to the stunning landscapes we traverse.

Keep your binoculars ready to spot whales and seabirds who follow in our wake.

**Day 5-8: Torngat Mountains National Park, NL, Canada**

##### **Hike the Mountainous Tundra and Spot Wildlife**

Spend four days exploring an area of treeless, mountainous tundra in Torngat Mountains National Park, where some of Canada's highest peaks east of the Rockies are found.

Enjoy your time hiking, visiting archaeological sites, and Zodiac cruising. Here, Inuit of Nunatsiavut will be your guides in their spiritual homeland.

Inuit of Nunavik and Nunatsiavut play a key role as partners in the management of Torngat Mountains National Park.

Many see the park as a portal for better understanding of Inuit culture. The word Torngat is derived from the Inuttut word tongait, meaning “place of spirits,” where Inuit shamans travelled to connect with higher powers. It is not hard, even for a visitor, to feel the power of the place.

Also be on the lookout for marine mammals, polar and black bears, caribou, falcons, and eagles.

#### **Day 9: Hebron**

##### **Ponder Poignant History**

Step back in time to the historical site of Hebron, which preserves a Moravian Mission station dating from the 1830s.

Call in at the old church, which is where Inuit who resided here in 1959 learned they would be forced to relocate.

Take a moment to read the plaque that commemorates this history and the apology to people affected by the relocations, issued by the government of Newfoundland and Labrador in 2005.

Listen to the stories shared by our guides and meet former Hebron residents and their kin who continue to visit the site and to hunt and fish nearby.



#### **Day 10: Nain** **Experience Inuit Culture**

Visit Nain, the most northerly community in Labrador and the administrative capital of Nunatsiavut. Stop in at the historic Moravian church, enjoy the brass band, and visit Illusuak, the stunning cultural centre. Expect a warm welcome and the opportunity to peruse arts and handicrafts at this dynamic visit.

This will be your first chance to see trees since the start of your journey!

#### **Day 11-12: The Labrador Coast** **Enjoy Hiking and Zodiac Cruises**

Explore the southern Labrador coast, where you'll find a diverse geography of coastal barrens, high subarctic tundra, high boreal forest, mid-boreal forest, string bog, and islands.

We'll make the most of every opportunity to hike and Zodiac cruise alongside our expedition team. With their expert guidance, every step of your journey will be filled with insightful interpretation, allowing you to truly appreciate the beauty and significance of the landscapes you encounter.

Choose the activity you prefer during expedition landings in this beautiful and quiet region.

#### **Day 13: L'Anse aux Meadows** **Immerse Yourself in Viking Archaeology**

Wander through the reconstructed Viking habitation at L'Anse aux Meadows, a UNESCO World Heritage Site and the only authenticated Norse settlement in North America. Learn more about the archaeological remains that date to approximately 1000 CE, and how—amazingly—the site was first found here in 1960 by a close reading of the Viking sagas.

Be sure to visit the superb interpretation centre and meet the actors in period costumes as you make your way through the reconstructed Norse-style sod buildings. This is a must-see for any visitor to Newfoundland and Labrador!







**Day 14: Terra Nova National Park**  
**Marvel at Breathtaking Vistas in Terra Nova National Park**

Explore the wonders of Canada's most easterly national park, where the land meets the sea in a stunning display of natural beauty.

Make your way to the park's visitor centre and dive into the mysteries of the ocean through touch tanks, marine exhibits, and aquariums. Located along the Newman Sound portion of the Terra Nova Migratory Bird Sanctuary, the visitor centre offers the perfect vantage point to spot fascinating shorebirds in their natural habitat.

Take a stroll along one of the park's scenic trails accompanied by our expert expedition team who

will offer interpretations of the surroundings. Marvel at the vibrant colours and intricate details of this extraordinary destination, where nature's power and beauty come together in perfect harmony.

**Day 15: St. John's, NL, Canada**  
**Wave a Fond Farewell**

**Day 1:** St. John's, NL, Canada

### **Begin Your Adventure**

Welcome to St. John's—Newfoundland's historic, vibrant capital. Sailing out of the port of St. John's, Signal Hill keeps watch as we exit the world-famous Narrows.

**Day 2-3:** Northeast Coast

### **Visit Picturesque Villages and Charming Communities**

The northeast coast of Newfoundland is known for the dozens of picturesque villages that dot its rocky

shores, and we'll find harbour in one of these unique communities. We look forward to a characteristically warm Newfoundland welcome upon our arrival. Photographers will have their work cut out for them, capturing all the special charm of classic island communities and stunning coastlines.

**Day 4:** L'Anse aux Meadows

### **Immerse Yourself in Viking Archaeology**

L'Anse aux Meadows, a UNESCO World Heritage Site, is the only authenticated Norse settlement in North America. The archaeological remains

found here in 1960 date to approximately 1000 CE. Amazingly, the location was first established by a close reading of the Viking sagas.

Today, a superb interpretation centre and several reconstructed Norse-style sod buildings make L'Anse aux Meadows a must-see for any visitor to Newfoundland and Labrador.

#### **Day 5: Red Bay Soak in Basque Whaling History**

The Red Bay Basque Whaling Station became a UNESCO World Heritage site in 2013. Basque whalers operated out of the Red Bay harbour in the 1500s: North America's first export industry.

The interpretation centre at Red Bay is excellent.

Here we find tools, personal items, and navigational instruments recovered from the wreck of the whaling ship San Juan. The ship was lost in a storm in 1565 and found centuries later submerged in the harbour. We'll visit nearby Saddle Island to learn the history of the whaling industry.

#### **Day 6-7: Gros Morne National Park & Woody Point Hike through Incredible Geology**

Gros Morne National Park's Tablelands, a six-hundred-metre plateau, form one of the world's best examples of exposed mantle. Normally found below the Earth's crust, the mineral-rich rocks support very little life, making the Tablelands an eerie landscape.

We will offer various walking and hiking options here. Views of Bonne Bay are spectacular. Gros Morne's interpretation centre is excellent and the town of Woody Point is a delight to explore.

#### **Day 8-9: Southern Coast Explore Scenic Coastlines and Remote Outports**

The wild and windswept coast of southern Newfoundland is home to a few remaining outport communities. Visits here are often a highlight of our journey.

There are many choices of unique bays and coves to explore via Zodiac or land excursions. Along the coast, the geology is outstanding, and the plant life is gorgeous. We'll be on the watch for wildlife, too. We'll make the most of every chance to explore this beautiful and remote coast.

### **Day 10: Miawpukek (Conne River) Experience Mi'kmaw Culture**

The First Nations community of Miawpukek became a permanent settlement sometime around 1822. Before then, it was one of many semi-permanent camps used by the Mi'kmaw people—who had traditionally travelled nomadically throughout the east coast of Canada.

Since its establishment as a reserve in 1987, Miawpukek has successfully bridged traditional knowledge and contemporary practice. We will receive a formal welcome from local leaders and have a chance to explore this special community.

### **Day 11: Saint-Pierre, France Visit European Shops and Cafés**

Explore Saint-Pierre, a last bastion of France's colonial territories in North America. The colourful and charming shops and residences of the town of Saint-Pierre reveal its unique historical character.

French food, wine, clothing, and culture are all on offer here. The sweets at the local cafes and bakeries are in high demand.

### **Day 12: St. John's, NL, Canada Wave a Fond Farewell**

On the final day of our expedition, we sail back through the Narrows and into St. John's harbour. We will say our farewells and the expedition team will be on hand to assist you with luggage and transportation arrangements.
